SUBCOURSE OVERVIEW

This subcourse is designed to teach the basic doctrinal factors and principles of the leadership process. It provides the foundation for subsequent leadership subcourses in this series. The traditional principles of leadership have long been the cornerstone of our leadership doctrine. The leadership factors, leadership competencies, and the BE, KNOW, and DO attributes provide you with the fundamentals of leadership and a framework for both self-development, and the development of your soldiers.

"The Role of the NCO in Leadership" subcourses (IS 7034 - IS 7037) are geared to meet the needs of the corporal through sergeant first class in the area of practical leadership application. These courses were written to complement the leadership instruction taught in NCOES. You do not have to be a PLDC graduate to take these courses but most of the material will build on that instruction. Some of you will take this subcourse before you attend PLDC or BNCOC. It will give you a good introduction to leadership principles. The most important reason for studying these subcourses is to give you additional information that will help you to be a better leader. The booklets are yours to keep, refer to them often.

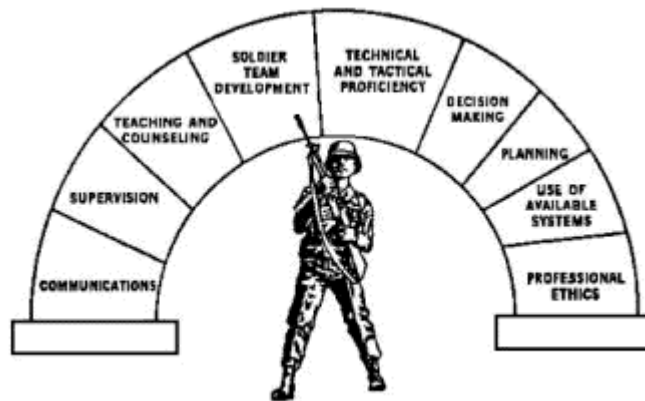
